	 Total public expenditure on education comprises the total budgetary expenditure on formal education of youth and adults at national and municipal levels. Public direct expenditure on educational institutions is included, as are transfers and payments to households and other private entities. Public expenditure on educational institutions comprises direct budgetary expenditure on: instructional educational institutions – kindergartens, primary schools, secondary schools, tertiary education institutions, adult education institutions in the part providing formal education; non-instructional education institutions – Ministry of Education, Science and Sports, residence halls for pupils/students, Centre for Curricular and Extracurricular Activities, National Examination Centre, National Education, and National Institute for Vocational Education and Training in the part providing formal education. Public transfers to households and other private entities include: transfers and payments to households (national school for payment is participation in education, subsidies for one-week outdoor school, etc.); transfers to other private entities (subsidies to transport operators for cheaper tickets for schoolchildren, pupils and students, subsidies for textbooks, learning technology and professional literature, expenditure one-week outdoor school, etc.).
	<u>International comparability</u> : Data on education are collected by the financial part of the UOE, a questionnaire common to three international organisations: U NESCO, O ECD, and E urostat. The indicator enables international comparisons with the EU and OECD countries. There are no reservations in comparing total public expenditure on education as a share of GDP. However, in

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	comparing the shares of public expenditure by level of education (preschool, primary, secondary, tertiary) we must pay attention to which level of education according to the international classification of education (ISCED) the figure in question refers to. For Slovenia, the figures for tertiary education, which corresponds to levels 5 and 6 of the ISCED, and for preschool education (ISCED 0) are directly comparable with the EU and OECD countries. For other levels of education, expenditure for Slovenia (SORS) is classified by the basic education levels in Slovenia, whereas the Eurostat database presents data separately for level ISCED 1 (first stage level of basic education) and combined for levels ISCED 2-4 (second stage of basic education in primary schools and secondary education).
